Summer Opportunities: for Research/Internship/Community Engagement/Global Experiences

Your summer experiences can enrich your Honors Thesis and potentially lead to a unique thesis project. Use these opportunities to start building your research skills, making connections with faculty, and exploring creative research ideas. Some projects/chairs (e.g., science-lab based) might require you to have prior research experiences BEFORE taking Thesis I.

- 1 Look for summer (or future) research opportunities early.
- Start organizing a list of prospective thesis chairs and check to see if you need prior research/lab experiences.
- You could integrate the summer experiences into your thesis project. It is also a good idea to start working on your Thesis II.



Thesis II Submissions:

- Draft Thesis (WK 7)
- Final Thesis (WK 11)
- Final Portfolio (WK 14)

You will complete EVERYTHING (analysis, writing, etc.), and submit your Final Thesis. Note that the final submission is early, therefore, the more you work during Thesis I and over the break, the easier completing Thesis II will be.

Thesis Roadmap

Fall

Start thinking about **Research Track** options:
Check to see if there is an Honors Thesis program (e.g., Psychology) in your department and look for future research opportunities.

Prospective Thesis Chairs, esp. if you have a specific topic as it may take a while to find a chair who works with that area. If you have no idea where to start, you can contact Honors Thesis Director or Honors faculty to brainstorm some ideas. You can also work with your honors advisor.

Ideally, your program of study includes one or more research related courses.

Thesis I Prep Time: Start meeting with your prospective thesis chairs—ideally, you would want to find your chair before registering for the course.

**Important!—If your project requires
IRB approval (for Human Subject
Research), take Thesis I in the spring and
submit the application before summer in
order to start Thesis II in the fall on time
—typically, a winter break is too short
for this process!


Thesis I Submissions:

- Confirm Thesis Chair (WK 5)
- Draft Prospectus (WK 9)
- Final Prospectus (WK 12)

You will confirm your chair and complete a Prospectus including Introduction, Literature Review, Outline, and Work Schedule. And, start working on your project! Your thesis chair may not be available in the summer.

Ideally, you would want to save this semester for an emergency in order for you to graduate as planned—you will need to receive the final grade on time (BEFORE Honors Graduation).
